SCFNZ National Forum 2016

The Safe Communities Foundation NZ (SCFNZ) National Forum was held in Wellington on 23rd and 24th August 2016. It was attended by 50 participants covering 31 Territorial Local Authorities and three facilitators. A further 8 speakers from Government agencies and non-government organisations attended part of the forum.

Presentations included SC highlights from the previous year, what it means to be a Safe Community, data evaluation and outcomes frameworks, the new NZ Fire Service (FENZ), the Fire Awareness & Intervention Programme (FAIP), mobilising communities around family violence, effective use of social media in the community setting, community operations and the Department of Internal Affairs, Rural Crime Prevention (NZ Police), and Injury Strategy and National Falls Prevention in Older Persons programme (ACC). In addition, there were community sharing sessions and opportunities for networking and discussion throughout the forum.

SCFNZ congratulates **Safer Napier** as recipient of the World Health Organization Western Pacific Regional Office Healthy Cities Recognition for Violence and Injury Prevention (Safe Cities).

Biannually since 2004, the Conference and General Assembly of the Alliance for Healthy Cities and WHO Western Pacific Regional Office has recognised outstanding work in selected areas. This aims to encourage cities in the Western Pacific Region to continue to innovate and demonstrate effective and efficient ways of promoting and protecting health and safety of urban populations.

Overall, 83 submissions were received this year from 30 cities across 7 countries.

SCFNZ had the pleasure of accrediting **Stratford District** in July and congratulates all those who have contributed to making Stratford a Safe Community.
