SC Coalition Survey: Synergy Shines

The annual SC coalition survey gives each SC an indication of how well their coalition (governance or leadership group) is working and identifies areas for potential improvement.

In the 2015 SC coalition survey, it was pleasing to see that 76% of SCs showed overall improvement in synergy, or maintained a high level of synergy, from previous years' surveys (see table below).

The overall synergy score indicates how successful the collaborative process of the coalition has been thus far.

ServeWise: a New E-Learning Tool from HPA

The HPA has released ServeWise, a new national e-learning tool, for frontline sellers and servers of alcohol. Developed in response to industry and regulatory agency for improved training standards and consistency between different types of licensed premises, the tool provides a basic understanding of the Sale and Supply of Alcohol Act. It includes the specific requirements of selling alcohol in off-licensed settings and serving alcohol in on-licensed venue. The training is free and takes about an hour to complete.

Global High-Level Conference on Road Safety

The 2nd Global High-level Conference on Road Safety aims to define ways to reduce road traffic fatalities by 50% by 2020, the target of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development. The meeting is hosted by the Brazilian government and co-sponsored by the World Health Organization. It will include 1500 delegates from 100 countries, including 60 ministers of transport, health and interior, and follows the recent release of the WHO Global Status Report on Road Safety.

Data for SC Communities

As part of SCFNZ's support of Safe Communities, data have been obtained from the government agencies. We have used it to calculate rates for individual Safe Communities and are in the process of compiling it and will send it out to coordinators soon. SCFNZ plans to do this annually. The currently available data include:

- rates of fatal and non-fatal injuries (NZHIS data sourced from the IPRU) – we have calculated rates according to leading causes, age, ethnicity and gender.
- rate and severity of road crashes from NZTA
- > rates of alcohol-related fatal and serious road crashes from NZTA.
